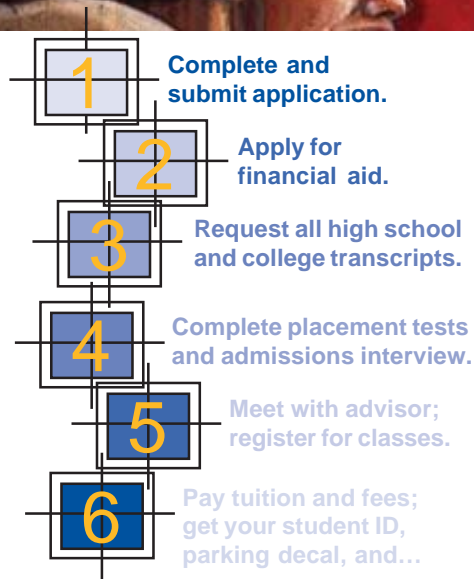

Associate In Science Program

General Education Core (44-45 SHC*)

The general education core includes study in the areas of humanities and fine arts, social and behavioral sciences, natural sciences and mathematics, and English composition.

English Composition (6 SHC)
ENG 111 and ENG 113

Humanities/Fine Arts (12 SHC)
Select FOUR courses from at least THREE of the following discipline areas: music, art, drama, foreign languages, interdisciplinary humanities, literature, and religion. AT LEAST ONE COURSE MUST BE A LITERATURE COURSE AND ONE COURSE MUST BE A PUBLIC SPEAKING COURSE.

Social/Behavioral Sciences (12 SHC)
Select FOUR courses from at least THREE of the following discipline areas: economics, geography, history, political science, psychology, and sociology. AT LEAST ONE COURSE MUST BE A HISTORY COURSE.

Natural Sciences/Mathematics (14-15 SHC)
Natural Sciences (8 SHC): Select a two-course sequence, including accompanying lab work.
Mathematics (6-7 SHC): Select at least one course in introductory mathematics (MAT 171, Precalculus Algebra, etc.) The other course must be selected from MAT 172 or MAT 271.

Other Required Hours (20-21 SHC)**
Courses in health, physical education, college orientation, and/or study skills may be included as other required hours.

ADMISSIONS POLICY

Dental Hygiene

The additional requirements for admission to the Dental Hygiene programs are:

1. Achieve acceptable scores on the ASSET and/or COMPASS Placement Service:

Retest Policy: Students may test twice in a six-month period. If they do not meet the scores after the second testing, there is a six-month wait before testing a third time. They must also provide proof of remediation before being allowed to test the third time. After the third test, there is a one-year wait from the date of the third test before being allowed to test again. At that time, the retest policy will repeat.

2. **Take the ACT test:** Registration information can be obtained from the Office of Student Development Services at Wayne Community College, area high school guidance counselors or from ACT (online at www.act.org or by telephone at 319-337-1270.

Scores should be submitted to **Wayne Community College (COLLEGE CODE 3171)** Previous ACT scores (taken within the last 5 years) from other institutions will be considered by the Admissions Committee. **The Office of Admissions and Records must receive ACT scores prior to the application deadline date.**

3. Complete an application for the Dental Hygiene Program.
4. Request ALL high school and college transcripts be sent to the Office of Admissions and Records by the application deadline date.
5. Completion of an interview with a Student Development counselor (specifically for dental program admissions.)
6. If accepted into a dental program, completion of a medical history, physical examination, dental examination and current CPR Certification prior to new student orientation.

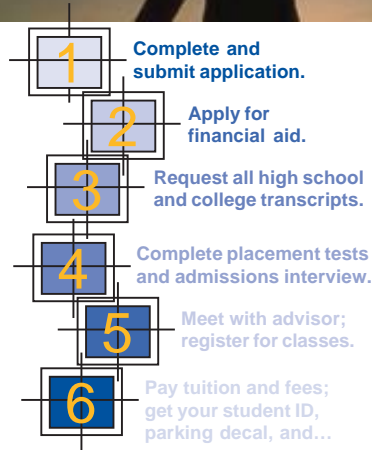

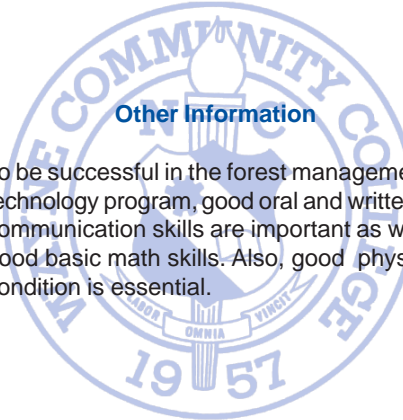
