■ The **Transitional Programs for College and Career** won the "Learning Upgrade Launch" competition and was awarded \$1,000 for the highest total of learner hours using an innovative Learning Upgrade mobile application in the fall semester.

■ WCC hosted the **NC Technology Student Association Eastern Region Conference** on February 8 and the **SkillsUSA NC East Regional Rally** on March 8. It was the college's first time hosting either event, and to have both in one year is unprecedented.

Interim Vice President for Academic and Student Services **Patty Pfeiffer** and Adult High School English Instructor **Rebecca Whitman** were panelists in Wayne County Reads programs on *Educated* by Tara Westover. Whitman participated in a book discussion and the topic of Pfeiffer's program was "Adverse Childhood Experiences, Resilience, and the Role of Education."



The College's top employees for 2018 were recognized in December. They are Controller **Annette Woodard** – Professional Employee of the Year, Transitional Programs for College and Career Department Administrative Assistant **Erica Babb** – Professional Support Staff of the Year Award, Humanities and Social Sciences Instructor **Steven Crowder** – Adjunct Faculty of the Year Award, and Evening Housekeeping Supervisor **Dwight D. Mozingo** – Operational and Maintenance Staff Employee of the Year Award.

The TSA conference brought 324 middle and high school students to the College to compete in 35 events and around 400 high school students competed in 68 events in the SkillsUSA rally.

the awards at the association's annual conference on March 25.

Building Project Given Green Light

The State Construction Office has authorized WCC to proceed with its contract with the “design-build” team of **Moseley Architects** and **Daniels and Daniels Construction Company** for a new Automotive and Collision Repair Building.

WCC is the first of the 58 NC Community College System member institutions to pursue the design-build delivery method with State Construction Office oversight.

College, architect, and contractor personnel are meeting weekly. The goal is to have a schematic design package completed by the end of March.
