■ The Upsilon Chi chapter of Phi Theta Kappa, the international honor society for two-year colleges, inducted **67 new members**. Phi Theta Kappa members represent the top 10 percent of students enrolled in two-year schools. To be invited into the society, WCC students must show academic achievement with a minimum grade point average of 3.5 and have completed at least 16 hours of associate degree course work.

■ Four WCC students were selected to present at this year's North Carolina Honors Association Conference. Janae Artis-Bass, Isaac Carreno, Guillermo Estrada, and Nicole Page were the only community college students invited to make oral

presentations. All talked about projects they had completed during WCC Honors Program courses.

CARRYING ON THE COLLEGE'S TRADITION OF CARING

- The Associate Degree Nursing Class of 2022 collected nearly 160 children's books and flash card sets and donated them to sites at which they practice skills: the college's child care center and WAGES Head Start. The contribution fit with their fall courses in maternal and pediatric nursing.
