With the success of its first **Turn the Tassel** event in December, WCC decided to use the same approach to provide Spring graduates with a COVID-19-safe commencement replacement. Despite rain, graduates and their families and friends participated in the May 7 walk-through event that celebrated the accomplishments of close to 500 curriculum graduates, nine Adult High School graduates, and 32 High School Equivalency diploma recipients.



WCC's new Artificial Intelligence and Automation Programming major was the subject of several news stories, including a piece by WRAL Reporter Keenan Willard. It is the first community college AI program in the state and one of just two such programs in the nation.

The college will be a partner in a **Technology Learning Lab** for middle school students for which Wayne County Public Library just received a \$100,000 grant from the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services. The middle schoolers will gain technology skills and concepts applicable to STEM-related careers and be introduced to AI. WCC students employed in Work Based Learning programs will provide programming alongside library staff.
