

WCC Single Search Basics: Find, Permalink and Cite JSTOR Scholarly Articles

Example: Find scholarly articles from the **JSTOR database** on the topic “**mark twain**” using a search of the relevant resources in the **WCC Single Search** discovery service, copy each **article permalink**, and retrieve each appropriate **article citation**:

Make sure you are in the Single Search tab area. Enter a simple search term into the WCC Single Search box, with no punctuation, click the Keyword radio button, and then the Search button

2. Click the **Single Search tab** if the webpage has not already defaulted to this search area
3. Into the **WCC Single Search box** under the **Single Search tab** enter the search word, or string of words, for the topic search you wish to conduct, using no punctuation or extra words
4. Click the **Search button** beside the **WCC Single Search box**
5. After clicking on the **WCC Single Search button**, a remote user of the Erwin Library online resources (that is, a person using any computer outside of the Erwin Library’s workstations), will, at the **Remote Location Database Access prompt page**:

6. At the **Search Results page**, if you want to retrieve only full-text, scholarly journal articles, under the **Refine Results heading** on the left of the screen:

- a. **NOTE:** The **Full Text checkbox** is always checked since the library does not subscribe to abstract-only databases
- a. Click inside the **Scholarly/Peer Reviewed checkbox** if you wish to eliminate all non-peer-reviewed items in the list (**JSTOR database** articles are all scholarly, but some may not be strictly peer-reviewed)
- b. Allow the automatic **Update function** to produce a revised **Result list**

NOTE: this list is not in alphabetical order, but in order by largest number of items found (the Hit Count) in a single database

7. To retrieve articles from the **JSTOR database** only:
 - a. In the **Filter By Content Provider** area click the **Show More option** at the bottom of the area to open the **Filter By Content Provider menu box**
 - b. In the **menu box** click inside the **JSTOR Journals checkbox** to confine the revised **Search Results list** to entries from journals in the **JSTOR database**
 - c. Click the **yellow Update button** at the bottom of the **Content Provider menu box** to close it and generate a new **Search Results List**

scientific positivism. In both cases the newly professionalizing discourse of science legitimates excursions into the transcendental, mystical realm that might otherwise be suspect (a strategy also famously employed by Freud).

In spite of their optimistic deployment of the legitimizing trappings of scientific discourse, however, both Twain's and Eddy's theories of subjectivity are characterized by a number of paradoxes or contradictions in relation to positivist science. Insofar as science's ideological privileging of the values of autonomy, competition, and mastery over dependence, cooperation, and submission mirrors that of liberal individualism, Twain's and Eddy's respective transpersonal theories of subjectivity appear to be in direct tension with those values. Both Twain and Eddy entertain a conception of the self that is collectivist rather than individualist and that is characterized by self-abandonment rather than self-control. By hypothesizing the potential of mind to influence mind, both raise questions about the problem of consent and the dangers of mind control, issues which constitute

3. Remember to verify and/or revise this retrieved citation for accuracy against a **citation guide** for the format (MLA or APA, etc.) that you need to use for your particular assignment or paper (Suggested Guide: [Purdue University's Online Writing Lab](#))

4. Click the “X” at the top right corner of the **dialogue box** to close it out
- b. Or, click the **Full Text from ProQuest link**:



- i. **NOTE:** Though this is a JSTOR database journal, the library also subscribes to it through another database from a company called ProQuest; occasionally, however, the library may *not* subscribe to a JSTOR journal through a JSTOR database, since we already have access through another database, such as one from ProQuest
- ii. **In the ProQuest interface**, you may also view the article from the **Full text tab** in HTML format, from the **Full text – PDF tab** in pdf, as well as click the **Download PDF button** on the right side of the page to download the entire pdf article to your computer or a flash drive to save it
- iii. Retrieve the **article permalink**:

2. Scroll down past the **Abstract** to the **Details area** and then farther down within it until you locate the **Document URL label**
3. Position your cursor to highlight, then **Copy** this **Document URL**, since it is the **Permalink** you can the **Paste** into another file or document to use to access the same article again later
2. Retrieve the **article citation**:



- i. **NOTE:** Though this journal article is from a **JSTOR journal**, that journal is also available in another database interface, this time from EBSCO, though most of the basic functions are the same as in ProQuest or JSTOR interfaces; occasionally, however, a JSTOR journal is only available to Erwin Library users in an EBSCO database, since we subscribe to only a fairly small subset of all JSTOR journals
- ii. Retrieve the **article permalink**:



1. Locate and click on the **Link icon (“∞” infinity sign)** in the area to the right of the **article full text window** to open a **Permalink box** above the **article full text window**
 2. Position your cursor inside the **Permalink box**, right click your mouse, and choose **Select All** from the **menu box**
 3. Right click again inside the **Permalink box** where the entire URL is now highlighted, and choose **Copy** from the **menu box**
